The interest in classic MGs continues to find its way into print in multiple publications. Two additional stories are shared on this page, through the attached links.

MGTC Spawns the Corvette

The MGTC created the desire for sports cars in the U.S. during the postwar period. There are many ways in which the TC brought attention to the benefits of light, quick handling cars. One of the most famous is the first Watkins Glen Grand Prix in 1948. MGTCs finished in 8 of the top 10 positions.

The famed General Motors' stylist Harley Earl attended the 1951 Watkins Glen Grand Prix and was impressed with the MGs and the enthusiasm for sports cars. It was the seed that encouraged him to pitch the



idea of an American-built sports car to the GM management.

In 1953, the new Chevrolet Corvette, a radical concept at the time, debuted. It was America's answer to the MG. However, even with all the dramatic publicity for the Corvette, the public loved MGs more. In 1953, 6510 MGTDs were built. Only 300 Corvettes made their way to the sales floor. The story of the MGTC inspiration for the Corvette appeared in the *National Corvette Museum Newsletter*, which you can read by <u>clicking here</u>.

Arnolt-MG

John Webber and *Classic Motorsports Magazine* brings us another story of MG history.

Stanley "Wacky" Arnolt was a Chicago automotive entrepreneur who sold multiple marques of automobiles and built some of his own. One was based on the MG of the day, MGTD. He commissioned the building of bodies, a coupe and a roadster, from Italian automotive designer, Bertone, attaching them to bare MGTD chassis purchased from MG. The result was a much different looking car.

Preserving History and Culture

Culture varies over time and among different groups of people. It is always changing, sometimes in ways that have effects of taking away things that were once cherished and enjoyed.

While reading the **Hagerty Drivers Club** magazine recently, I found two authors who were outstanding in selecting words to describe the changing culture in automobiles. I will lean on their words to accurately describe this phenomenon more eloquently than I might.

"Your future is electrified push-button slot cars in which anyone with a pulse can go warp speed, protected by software that makes everyone seem competent to do so.

"And, with that, a glorious chapter in our automotive story will be over. It is sad, but the evolution is inevitable. Certain art forms have simply run their course. Orchestral music enjoyed a few centuries of rabid popularity at the pointy tip of the cultural spear before sputtering largely to idle sometime in the mid-20th century. It was replaced by jazz, which was replaced by rock, which was replaced by pop, which was replaced by noise. As one art form stalls, the culture moves on, leaving some of its greatest masters dumped in pauper's graves.

"Think of yourself as a deputized, badge-wearing preserver of culture. By fixing up your old car, you're like a saxophonist who blows a few hours a day so people can still hear Charlie Parker the way the Yardbird was meant to be heard." (*Aaron Robinson*)

McKeel Hagerty wrote about his philosophy of life and of being a parent by describing his process of teaching one of his daughters how to drive a manual transmission in his '32 Ford hot rod.

"I've come to believe that life is about adding tools (read: skills) in your toolbox, both mental and physical.

"This summer's project was driving a manual. My



middle daughter, Sophia, learned to drive an automatic last year, but as a member of a car family, she understands that driving a modern automatic car isn't a full driving experience. Real driving is about feeling like you and the car are one. It's about mastery of a mechanical object. And freedom. And being in control. And tight corners. And long straightaways. And a whole bunch of other things as well." (*McKeel Hagerty*)

Maintaining and driving your MG is more than a hobby. It is the preservation of history. It is preserving a slice of culture. It is sharing that beautiful piece of music that is no longer played on the radio. It is about becoming one with a purposeful piece of machinery. It is finding joy in traveling the less-traveled roads. It is sharing culture with others who are unknowledgeable.

So, head out to the garage. Grab a few wrenches or that can of wax and make your MG a sweetrunning, gleaming representative of a glorious culture. Share the history by taking it on a drive while watching people give you the "thumbs-up."
